December Spiritual Discipline: Meditation on Scripture

"Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14). We cannot know God apart from His Word. His Word governs all things and reveals all He wants us to know about Himself. God spoke. Creation came to be. All things were made through the Word, and apart from the Word was nothing made.

In time, the Word took on flesh. He became man. This is what we recall throughout the season of Advent. Our Immanuel has come. The King of Glory, the creator of all things, becomes one with those He created. He does this to redeem our flesh. He comes as a babe in a crib to die as a man on the cross to be raised from the crypt. This is the fullness of His grace and the truth He reveals to you. The Word has come to enlighten your eyes. He has come to give you the right to be born as children of God.

We speak of the "Word of God" in three different but interrelated ways. First, the Word of God is Jesus. This means that the other two ways we speak of the Word all point to Jesus. Second, the Word of God is the written Word (Holy Scripture). Third, the Word of God is the spoken Word.

If we want the true light to enlighten our eyes to who He is and what He has come to do, then we must be receivers of the written and oral Word. It is through these that the Word made flesh makes His dwelling among us and brings us the benefits of His life, death, and resurrection. The pages of Holy Scripture are full of Christ. They are colored in the blood of Christ for all Scripture testifies of Him. If you desire to receive Christ, then receive His Word.

As we embark on this season of Advent and for us at Good Shepherd, a year of intentionally training ourselves through spiritual disciplines, let us be hearers of the Word. It is by the hearing of the Word that faith is formed, nourished, and strengthened.

OUR DISCIPLINE FOR DECEMBER IS TO READ A MINIMUM OF ONE CHAPTER FROM THE BIBLE DAILY. Options abound for how this may be done. You can read one chapter of Proverbs every day this month and complete one book. You could combine some shorter books together to get to 31 chapters. Freedom abounds. But let's all continue in or begin the habit of daily meditation on Holy Scripture.

May you cultivate the habit of daily Scripture reading and be blessed to see Christ for you in the pages of Holy Writ.

Spiritual disciplines are sacred practices that intentionally alignus with God's will.

January Spiritual Discipline: Praying the Psalms

How does one become a theologian? The answer is dependent on what the word "theology" means. Theology means the study of God. Everyone has some thoughts about God. Therefore, everyone is a theologian.

But we've got to dig a little deeper. The question isn't precise enough. Everyone, even the pagan, is a theologian. How does one become a good theologian? That's the question we are after. Being a good theologian doesn't require years of seminary training or a PhD. Dr. Luther suggested that the following three things are required for the making of a theologian: oratio, tentatio, meditatio.

For our December spiritual discipline, we took up meditatio. Our focus was on meditation on the Holy Scriptures. Lord willing, if it wasn't already, it is now your habit to minimally read one chapter of Scripture per day. Keep that going. We'll add more to it in the coming months.

This month, we take up oratio or prayer. In January, we are going to intentionally cultivate or improve the habit of prayer in our lives. What do we pray? What did Jesus pray? For sure, we have the model prayer our Lord gave us, the Lord's Prayer, but let us also consider that our Lord made use of the ancient prayer text of God's people: the Psalms.

Luther writes concerning the Psalter: "The Psalter ought to be a precious and beloved book, if for no other reason than this: it promises Christ's death and resurrection so clearly—and pictures his kingdom and the condition and nature of all Christendom—that it might well be called a little Bible. In it is comprehended most beautifully and briefly everything that is in the entire Bible." LW 35:254 "Moreover the Psalter does more than this. It presents to us not the simple, ordinary speech of the saints, but the best of their language, that which they used when they talked with God himself in great earnestness and on the most important matters. Thus the Psalter lays before us not only their words instead of their deeds, but their very hearts and the inmost treasure of their souls, so we can look down to the foundation and source of their words and deeds. We can look into their hearts and see what kind of thoughts they had, how their hearts were disposed, and how they acted in all kinds of situations, in danger and in need." (LW 35:254-255)

Think of how Jesus prays the Psalter! "My God, my God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Psalm 22:1). "The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone." (Psalm 118:22). "Into your hands

I commit my spirit" (Psalm 31:5). In Matthew 26 we are told that our Lord and His disciples sang a hymn after their time in the upper room. Almost surely, they sang Psalm 113-118. The hallel (think hallelujah) psalms were traditionally sung at the celebration of the Passover.

We can take a cue from our Lord. Think on it: the Lord inspired men to write down His words in the Psalms that men might pray the Lord's words back to Him. Then let us pray.

YOUR SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE FOR JANUARY IS TO DAILY PRAY A PSALM. If you are looking for suggestions, consider hallel Psalms (113-118) or the Psalms of Ascent (120-134) or the penitential psalms (6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, and 143). You can even pick one psalm and stick to it for the entire month. Whatever you deem fit. But let us pray the psalms and learn together what it is the Lord wants us to pray as we become better theologians through the little Bible that is the Psalter.



As your pastor, I write with deep joy and thanksgiving for the faith-filled response you have shown toward the stewardship needs of our congregation. In a time when many grow weary or anxious about earthly matters, your generous giving, faithful service, and steadfast prayers have borne witness to the living faith that Christ has worked in your hearts. Truly, as the Apostle Paul wrote, "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine making request for you all with joy, for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now" (Philippians 1:3–5).

A Message from Vícar Hallock

"Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary and was made man." These words from the Nicene Creed describe the purpose of the incarnation. Specifically, the incarnation is for us and our salvation from the sin that has enslaved us and separated us from God. We have been discussing the person of Jesus Christ for the last few newsletters. We contemplated at length how we rightly distinguish the natures and how they work together in communion with one another for our salvation. Now we will discuss the works that the person of Jesus does to accomplish salvation. This newsletter will explore what Scripture reveals about Christ's works and why it matters for us and our salvation.

Before I explain the works of Jesus, it is important to note that when Jesus does his works he does them using both natures. There's never a time when one of his natures simply shuts off. Persons act according to nature. Since Christ has two natures, he acts according to both. For example, when Scripture says "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:7), he does this using both natures. Here you see that his human blood becomes the means by which God divinely forgives our sins. Another example that Scripture gives is, "The bread that I shall give is My flesh, which I shall give for the life of the world" (John 6:51). You will notice that Jesus says his flesh is life-giving. Again, both natures are at work, his human flesh is life-giving. This is important because to deny this reality is to deny the purpose of the incarnation and the incarnation itself.

The works that Jesus does, as the incarnate God, for our salvation can be grouped under three offices that he exercises: prophet, priest, and king. Christ is a prophet because he was sent to deliver God's revelation of salvation "God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in time past to the fathers by the prophets, has in these last days spoken to us by His Son, whom He has appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the worlds" (Hebrews 1:1-2). Christ is a priest because he has reconciled the world to God through his sacrifice "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself." (2 Corinthians 5:19). And finally, Christ is a king because he governs and rules over all things "And

He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end" (Luke 1:33).

Christ exercises these offices in two states: his state of humiliation and state of exaltation. The state of humiliation is how he exercised these offices while he was on earth, while the state of exaltation is how he performed these offices after the ascension. He does the same works and exercises the same offices in both states.

So how does he exercise his offices in both states? In the prophetic office, in his state of humiliation, he taught the people immediately face-to-face (see Hebrews 1:1). In his state of exaltation, he teaches through the holy Ministry which is tasked with preaching the same Gospel "As the Father has sent Me, I also send you" (John 20:21). In this state, he works through means, in this case, the holy Ministry to deliver the proclamation of the Gospel "If anyone speaks, let him speak as the oracles of God." (1 Peter 4:11). In the priestly office, in his state of humiliation, he lived a holy life and reconciled the world to God through the shedding of his blood (see 2 Corinthians 5:19 above). As the priest, he takes our place and is crucified for the sins of the world. Unlike the priests of old, he does not offer up continual sacrifices but offered himself once and this sacrifice applies for all time. In his state of exaltation, he intercedes for us and serves as our mediator "We have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (1 John 2:1). In his kingly office, he exercises his rule in both states and is present everywhere "You have made him to have dominion over the works of Your hands; You have put all things under his feet "(Psalms 8:6). Here his kingly rule can be broken down into three kingdoms: the Kingdom of Power, where he rules over all people even unbelievers; the

Kingdom of Grace, where he rules over those who have heard the Gospel through the Word and are part of the Church; and the Kingdom of Glory, which is the Kingdom of Grace extended into eternity where all believers will dwell with him.

Why does any of this matter? Because these are the works Christ does to save us from our sins. Without these works, his incarnation would have no purpose. All these works Jesus did so that you may be reconciled to God. He does this work so that you would be forgiven of all the sins that plague you. No longer do you live bound to your sin and guilt, but Christ has freed you through his marvelous works as prophet, priest, and king "for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10).



Have a Blessed Thanksgiving!




