From The Desk Of *Pastor Mark Loder*

February Spiritual Discipline: Memorizing Scripture

Moses teaches us: “4 Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one! 5 You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. 6 “And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart. 7 You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up. 8 You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. 9 You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.” (Deuteronomy 6:4-9).

The Word of God is always to be in our hearts, in our minds, and on our tongues. This Word is our only defense against the evil one, the world, and our own sinful flesh. If we are to think on things that are true, noble, beautiful, right, pure, lovely, and admirable, then the Word must consistently be before us. The conscience must be informed with the truth in order to stand on truth when tempted and troubled. These are reasons for us to memorize Scripture.

Memorization, in many ways, is a lost art. We live in a time of ease. We can type a word into a search bar or thumb through an index to find multiple verses on a topic of choice. On the whole, such modern innovation has not improved our biblical literacy or made us better students of Holy Writ. One only needs to read a Chrysostom, Luther, or Walther sermon to see how

much more biblically astute those men were than us. There is work to be done. This is our great opportunity.

FOR FEBRUARY, WE ARE GOING TO WORK ON THE HABIT OF MEMORIZING SCRIPTURE. If it's not already something you are actively doing, start small. Begin with one verse per week. Write the verse down on a piece of paper, pull it out multiple times a day, and read it aloud; likely you will have it nailed down in no time. If it's already your habit to memorize Scripture, work on a bigger chunk of text.

One of the benefits of forcing ourselves to memorize Scripture is that it keeps the Word of God constantly before us. Scripture is no longer relegated to a morning or evening routine. It becomes something that's thought about in all our comings and goings. It becomes not merely an aspect of our life or a to-do list item to check off. It becomes the very thing we orient our lives around.

Consider the joy you would have in memorizing one verse of Scripture every week of the year. After 365 days, you would have 52 verses to use in conversations, in catechizing, and in fighting the temptations of the devil. Your eyes would be more clearly opened to see Jesus as your Lord and Savior.

We do not live by bread alone. We live by every word that proceeds from the mouth of our God. Let us do so intentionally, binding that Word as frontlets before our eyes.

No meeting in January.





A Message from Vicar Hallock

“Who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death.” In our Small Catechism, these are the words we confess when we recite the second article of the Apostles’ Creed. We believe that Christ gave his life to redeem us from our sin and guilt. All that we have been discussing in the last few newsletters has led to this article. When we examine our state and the state of our world, we find wickedness all around us. But this article confesses that Christ has redeemed us from guilt. But with such great news that we hear time and time again, it begs the question, how is this obtained? How do we receive this wonderful redemption? How does it become ours? In our modern Christian world, you will hear no shortage of answers ranging from a personal decision to follow Jesus to gaining it by meritorious acts of love. But is that what Scripture reveals? What does Scripture reveal about how we receive the redemption of Christ for us?

Scripture establishes first and foremost that our salvation is not based on any achievement on our part, but is based purely on the love and mercy of God. Saint Paul writes, “Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith apart from the deeds of the law” (Romans 3:28). By works of the Law, Paul means following the commandments of God. No matter how hard we try to follow the commandments or do good works toward our neighbor, no work will be good enough to save us from our condition. By faith alone we are justified, that is, declared righteous by God, not by any observance of God’s commandments.

But you may be asking why not, why can’t our good works save us? Let’s assume, for the sake of argument, that we could render good works to atone for our sins. We know that we sin and we know that we make mistakes. In order to amend our mistakes, you would have to go above and beyond. But no work that we do is going above and beyond because they are merely our duty to do, as Scripture testifies, “The end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man” (Ecclesiastes 12:13). Therefore, only someone who can render works greater can atone for our sin. And this comes through Christ, God, who was the only one who could pay it, though only man owed a debt

to God, and he took on human flesh to pay that debt. Only faith can save us and not works of the Law, as Scripture clearly teaches. This faith is not merely a historical knowledge of Christ nor a mere intellectual assent. This kind of faith, even the demons have, they too acknowledge Jesus was real. Faith is more than historical knowledge, it is trust. But trust in what? Trust in the promises of God, that for the sake of Christ, you have been redeemed, forgiven, and rescued. Christ, who took on your very human flesh and blood, was crucified and raised that you may be reconciled and reunited with the Father “In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation” (2 Corinthians 5:19). Faith saves because it clings to the promise of the Gospel. The object of faith is the Gospel itself. Faith is the instrument of the Holy Spirit that brings the good gift of the Gospel to us: “For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God” (Ephesians 2:8). This faith comes to us through the Word, the testimony of the inspired witnesses “So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God” (Romans 10:17). This Word that is preached, convicts our hearts of our sins and offers the remedy in the Gospel: “And this is the testimony: that God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son” (1 John 5:11). Saving faith embraces that the promises of God are true and certain. Saving faith has confidence in this promise of the forgiveness of sins.

God has given us this great assurance by faith that he has redeemed and forgiven us all our sins. But sometimes we struggle to believe this truth. Our guilt often weighs down our hearts and we struggle to imagine that God could love poor sinners like ourselves. We struggle even when the Word plainly tells us that God gave his life for us and came “not to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many” (Matthew 20:28). As signs and tokens of salvation, he gives us the Holy Sacraments; namely Baptism and the Eucharist. In Baptism, he washes away our sins and gives us the Holy Spirit “There is also an antitype which now saves us—baptism (not the removal of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God), through the resurrection of Jesus Christ” (1 Peter 3:21). Additionally, he gives us his very own body and blood to eat and drink under bread and wine for the forgiveness of sins. In the Eucharist, we truly commune and fellowship with our savior. In that bread and wine, we receive life and salvation, for where there is the forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation. God seals his promises with these sacraments, which truly bring us his gift of the Gospel. And especially, these gifts confirm and strengthen our faith, which has received the promises of God, that for the sake of Christ’s merits we are accounted righteous.
