# From The Desk Of Pastor Mark Loder

Change is inevitable. Seasons shift, leaders transition, communities grow or shrink, and challenges rise unexpectedly. The Church is facing a season of change as the culture has left Christianity as a foundational compass. And for the Church—Christ's body on earth—change can feel especially unsettling. We often cling tightly to what is familiar, not because we lack faith, but because we yearn for the stability and certainty that God alone provides. We cling to what is familiar because it provides a sense of safety and security.

But how should we, as a congregation, respond to change? The answer lies not in resisting change itself, but in anchoring ourselves in what does not change: God's Word, Christ's promises, and our confessional identity.

As Christians, we remember that Christ is our constant amid change. The writer of Hebrews reminds us: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." (Hebrews 13:8) This is not merely a comforting slogan—it's a theological anchor. Christ's unchanging nature assures us that His mercy, Word, Sacraments, and faithfulness endure through every change we experience. The church is not built upon the foundation of wood or stone, but on the Word of God, which is our sure foundation. That Word sustains us through changing circumstances, leadership, worship styles, or ministry directions.

The Lutheran Reformation itself was a moment of tremendous upheaval. Yet it was a return to what was firm: the Gospel, the Scriptures, and the pure doctrine. Change, when it draws us closer to Christ and His means of grace, is not something to fear, but to embrace with reverence. St. Paul writes: "Let all things be done decently and in order." (1 Corinthians 14:40)

While changes do happen and can be necessary, any change in the Church must be done not by the whims of culture or convenience but for the sake of the Gospel and the building up of Christ's body (Ephesians 4:11–16). That means keeping Christ's gifts front and center: Baptism, Absolution, the Lord's Supper, faithful preaching, and catechesis.

Picture a ship sailing across a vast, stormy sea. Waves crash. Winds shift. The crew must adjust the sails constantly, sometimes even change course. But one thing never changes: the lighthouse fixed on the shore, shining its beam steadily. No matter how the ship moves, the lighthouse is their guide and anchor.

In this life, the Church is the ship. The storms are many—cultural upheaval, transitions in leadership, new challenges in ministry. Yet Christ is our lighthouse, immovable and bright, always calling us home. We steer by His Word, we correct our course with His Law and Gospel, and we rest in His Sacraments.

Let us face change with neither dread nor despair but with faith in the unchanging Savior. We can walk forward as a congregation not with fear of what lies ahead, but with confidence in the Lord who goes before us: "Fear not, for I am with you; Be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand." (Isaiah 41:10)

As we move through the seasons of our congregation's life, may we remain anchored in Christ, confident that the One who has called us by name will preserve us to the end.

Faithfulness: The Stewardship Standard "Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2).

What is the standard to which a steward is held? Ask the average person, and they might talk about percentages, tithes, and commitments. Too often, the default mode of measuring stewards is by how much and how frequently they give. This is not helpful. Measuring activity without any connection to baptismal identity is a recipe for disaster. It can either breed a sense of superiority and self-righteousness or create a culture of scarcity and despair. Neither outcome is godly or helpful.

This is not to say that stewardship should be regarded as "no big deal." St. Paul, within his discussion of the ministry to which he has been called, sets the standard of accountability for the steward: faithfulness. This removes any sense of superiority or self-righteousness and dispels scarcity and despair. When a steward manages what the Lord has entrusted to them — resources and all aspects of life — for God's purposes, the focus is not on how much or how frequently they give.

This standard reflects the stewardship portrayed in the Gospels where Jesus entrusts varying amounts, each according to ability. The commended stewards were recognized for their faithfulness in their vocation, not the amounts they managed. Conversely, the condemned stewards were not castigated for their lack of performance but for their lack of faithfulness.

What does this mean for the steward in the pew? The Lord has entrusted you with various things. Luther captures them in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed and the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. The familiar couplets of food and drink, house and home, spouse and children, land, animals and all possessions are the Lord's, and He has entrusted them to you for His purpose. This trust brings an active realization of thanksgiving.

This active thanksgiving is our stewardship. It can be distilled into two questions that the steward regularly needs to answer:

- 1. How has God blessed me?
- 2. How is He calling me to respond?

The first question is quite simple to answer: if the Lord has entrusted something to you, it is a blessing. This blessing is for God's glory and the benefit of your neighbor. The second question is more challenging to measure; it is not about percentages and charts. Instead, it is about a life of thanksgiving that flows from the mercies of God revealed in Jesus Christ. This thanksgiving starts at and flows from the cross and the empty tomb. Our stewardship of the Gospel drives our stewardship of everything else.

The standard, then, is faithfulness. Faithfulness flows from eyes focused on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. It does not come from our efforts but through the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives, through Word and Sacrament. It begins at the altar in the Divine Service but extends into the world — from hearth and home to workplace and classroom, from commerce to leisure. The mercy of God, freely given in Jesus, leads us to demonstrate a faithfulness that reveals to others the same mercy we have received in Jesus.

This faithfulness cannot be measured empirically. It is simply allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us for the glory of God and the benefit of our neighbor. Weekly. Daily. Faithfully.

# **CURRENT STATISTICS:**

11.1% or 1 in 9 adult population (20 79 yrs.) is living with Diabetes. Over 4 in 10 are unaware they have Diabetes. 38.4 million people have Diabetes in the USA. 28.7 million people, including 29.45 million adults are diagnosed as Diabetics. 8.7 million people (22.8% of adults with Diabetes) are undiagnosed.

There are two types of Diabetes:

Type 1 Diabetes- this is an autoimmune disease. This means the body's immune system attacks the insulin producing cells in the pancreas-leading to a lack of insulin.

Type 2 Diabetes This type occurs when the body doesn't produce enough insulin or when the cells don't respond properly to insulin.

Type 1 requires life-long insulin therapy through injections or an insulin pump to manage blood The exact cause is unknown. sugar levels. Symptoms are abrupt in onset, often in childhood Excessive thirst, frequent or adolescence. urination, unexplained weight loss and fatigue. Type 2 is often symptom free or at a gradual onset. Most often in adulthood. Excessive thirst, frequent urination, fatigue. Insulin and other medications are used in treating Type 2 Diabetes. Having your blood sugar tested frequently is part of the treatment plan. Diet is carefully planned also, Understanding the disease and taking educational classes on it will be extremely helpful.

Risk factors for the onset are Obesity, physical inactivity, family history of Diabetes and older age. Alcohol can contribute. Neuropathy of toes and feet should be medically considered.

# WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR ME?

Blood work testing will help identify if you are at risk or if you have pre-diabetes. A blood sugar of 100-123 is considered pre-diabetic. This is approximately 1 in 3 people.

# **CONSIDERATIONS:**

What matters? What are the goals for my life? Do I know what my Blood count is? How about your Blood Pressure? Careful toenail care is encouraged.

Do I understand my medications? Prescriptions? Do I accurately read the labels on my Prescriptions? How about Over the Counter Medications? Are they compatible with the rest of my medications?

Mentation- Prevent, identify, treat and manage my mental attitude in regard to health situations. If heredity plays a definite role in my health situation, how do I feel about that?

Do you feel that Diabetes is a death sentence? It definitely is not! If that plays a part in your life, it is important to talk to someone about that. Another consideration is Fasting but must be done very cautiously and with a careful plan. A recent Physician speaker I heard has done and is currently conducting a controlled program with Diabetics who have been able to get their Blood sugar levels in a very good range using a controlled fasting program. I do have more information on this if you are interested.

Because this disease/condition is so prevalent, please seriously consider the possibility in your life and in the lives of your family.


